Methodology

This is the sixth of a six-part series of reports tracking the diffusion of misinformation in the 2020 U.S. presidential election campaign period. Data in this wave were collected from an online panel of American adults, recruited by Qualtrics. Data were collected from 18 to 27 November 2020. The sample size was 1118 (margin of error \approx 3%). Fifty one percent of participants were female. The average age was 46.03 (SD = 17.5), with a range of 18 to 98. The sample was 61.5% white, 13.3% Black, and 8.4% Latina/Latino.
